

WART TREATMENT INSTRUCTIONS

AT-HOME WART TREATMENT

- Our specifically formulated V-Cream is designed to further enhance our in-office wart treatments between appointments.
- Soak the warts in warm water for 5 minutes every night. Apply the wart medicine directly to the warts, avoiding the normal skin (applying Vaseline to surrounding skin can help protect it).
- Cover the treated wart with a band-aid. Leave the band-aid in place at least overnight or, if possible, for 24 hours. Repeat these steps nightly until the wart is gone.
- Expect the skin of the treated wart to appear moist, white and even irritated during treatment.
- Do not use this medicine on the face or groin area.

"IN-OFFICE" WART TREATMENTS

- CRYOTHERAPY is liquid nitrogen treatment used to freeze warts in the office.
 - After cryotherapy, the treatment area will often blister and become red and swollen, or even blood-filled.
 - It is best to leave the blister alone, applying Vaseline or Aquaphor and covering with a band-aid.
 - 2-3 days post-treatment, the area will become moist. You can safely wash the area with water and a mild soap. If the weeping is excessive, try to cover the area with Vaseline or our Heal Ointment and a band aid.
 - 3-4 days post-treatment, a scab may start to form. The scab will remain in place for up to 2 weeks and then the area should heal. Do not pick or remove the scab!
 - Return to the office for reevaluation and further treatment if necessary in 2-3 weeks.
 - Many warts require multiple cryotherapy treatments.
 - Cryotherapy may result in the treated area becoming darker or lighter than it was before, and the color change can take months to resolve.
- CANDIDA ANTIGEN INJECTIONS is a medication that is injected into/under the wart in the office.
 - After a candida antigen injection, the treatment area may be itchy/red, and sometimes mild blistering and swelling may occur. The wart may turn black, crust, and fall off.
 - If you notice a rash develop post-treatment, please call our office.
 - One-month post-treatment a follow-up visit is usually required to see if additional treatments are required.
- CANTHARIDIN or TRICHLOROACETIC ACID (TCA) are a topical medications applied to warts in the office.
 - After a cantharidin or TCA treatment, a blister may form on the treatment area, and it will become red and swollen.
 - Cantharidin must be washed off with soap and water 8-12 hours after application. It may cause a blister that is blood-filled.
 - It is best to leave the blister alone, applying Vaseline or Heal Ointment and covering with a band-aid.



- Many warts require multiple cantharidin or TCA treatments, spaced 2-3 weeks apart.
- Cantharidin or TCA treatment may result in the treated area becoming darker or lighter than it was before, and this may take months to resolve.
